From the Pastor's Desk

Giving Thanks

Peace to you! I hope you all had time to watch "The Veil Removed," video on <u>www.theveilremoved.com</u>. What did you think of it? I am looking forward to hearing your thoughts. This weekend begins the 9-day gun deer hunting season in Wisconsin. Let's prayer for safety to all hunters and for a successful hunt. St. Hubert, pray for us!

I do love Thanksgiving and that our country (for now anyway) still has this civic holiday which has its origin in our Christian heritage. When I lived in Italy, I realized the uniqueness of our country's celebration (although I think that Canada might also have a day of thanksgiving). The Europeans I encountered thought that having a day to give thanks was very cool and said that they wished their countries had a similar holiday.

The topic of Thanksgiving brings up a simple by important point. When someone is grateful or thankful, they "give thanks." But if you are giving thanks, you have to give that thanks to someone or something. There is no way to be grateful to nothing. The idea of "being thankful" or having a grateful heart simply means that a person has the character or virtue of being able to give thanks to someone or something for the gifts, blessings, or help they have received. In the Romance languages (stemming from Latin), if you use the verb "to thank" you include some form of the verb "give" with it. In Latin "gratias ago," in Italian, "ringraziare," in French, "remercier." The main point of all of this to simply say that if someone is thankful or grateful, they have to be thankful to someone or something.

But who or what are we thanking? Of course, in the United States which has a historically Christian culture, we are giving thanks to God. For those who do not believe in God (or some sort of divine being), it seems that the concept of gratitude is more difficult. How deeply can one be grateful to blind chance? Or to "fate"? Or to "science" or "the Earth"? Or to the random events and reasons which result in my having life, health, food, shelter, family, love, a good community, a nation which is free, etc...? I would think it would be difficult to be thankful for these things because they do not solely come from other human beings, but which are obviously blessings from Someone, a personal Being who knows us and cares for us. And so, I think that all the references to giving thanks during this holiday which do not acknowledge God as the source of our blessings ring hollow. We are not just being grateful to "random circumstances" or to each other (although that is a good thing to do!) or to ourselves. We are grateful to God and we give Him thanks. That is what this holiday has always been about. We recognize that we owe praise and thanks to God, because He is the source of every good. We recognize that the most powerful force in the world is not oppression or greed or despair, nor even our own efforts or good deeds to counter evil, but the grace and goodness of God. Without Him, we are nothing and have nothing.

"But Father," you may say, "some people don't believe in God. I am just trying to be inclusive by not mentioning God at Thanksgiving. I don't want to impose my beliefs on others." Well, it is good to be respectful of others and to not be a jerk. That is always true. But if you sacrifice your very sensible and true belief in God just so that you do not possibly hurt someone's feelings, then aren't you, in a certain sense, letting them impose their beliefs (that God does not exist) upon you? In other words, don't be so inclusive of others that you exclude God. Tolerance is not giving up your convictions, but respecting other people because they are people, not because of their beliefs. It is ok for other people to be wrong and you to be correct. And it is ok for you to say so. And it is ok to demand that others show you the same respect that you show to them.

During this time of Thanksgiving, let us become more aware of the things for which we can be thankful, even in the midst of difficult circumstances. Here are some suggestions for things that you can do to thank God as you and your family celebrate Thanksgiving Day. 1) Come to 8 AM Mass at St. Charles on Thanksgiving morning. 2) Go around the table and have each family member say one thing for which they are thankful to God. 3) Read one of these Bible verses aloud at the dinner table before you eat.

"And whatever you do, whether in word or deed, do it all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through Him" (Colossians 3:17).

"Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 4:6-7).

"Oh, give thanks to the Lord, for He is good, for His steadfast love endures forever!" (Psalm 107:1).
