From the Pastor's Desk

Staying Awake and Advent Wreaths

Peace to you! I hope that you all had a wonderful Thanksgiving Day and some time to look with gratitude upon all the blessings that God has given us. I also hope that all our hunters had good success! I know that this time of year with the holidays can be difficult for some people, especially those who are mourning the loss of loved ones. It has been one year since my grandfather Leonard passed away and boy do I miss him being around. May he and all of our deceased loved ones rest in the peace of Christ and enjoy the eternal "holy days" of the heavenly homeland. This Sunday is the 1st Sunday of Advent, the season of preparation for Christmas and also the first days of the new liturgical year. This year, Advent is the longest it can ever be (28 days), since Christmas is on a Sunday this year and the 4th week of Advent is a full seven-day week. Next year, Advent will be the shortest it can be (only 21 days).

The name "Advent" comes from the Latin *ad venio*, which means "to come to." "Adventus" means "arrival" or "coming." During this time the Church exhorts us all to prepare ourselves worthily to celebrate the anniversary of the Lord's first "advent" or coming into the world as the incarnate God and Savior of the human race. And so, we are to prepare for this celebration by making our souls fitting dwelling places for the Redeemer who comes to us in Holy Communion. We are called to obtain the Sacrament of Reconciliation, to pray, and to fast as we await the arrival of our Savior. Advent is not as strict as Lent and there are no rules for fasting, but it is meant to be a period of self-preparation. Our more immediate preparation during Advent for the worthy celebration of Our Lord's Nativity helps us to be prepared for His final coming as judge, both at our deaths and at the end of the world.

The first week of Advent focuses on preparation for the Lord's Second Coming. The main message of Jesus to His disciples is "Stay awake! For you do not know on which day your Lord will come." The 2nd and 3rd Sundays of Advent focus on the figure of St. John the Baptist, who is a model for us in how to "stay awake" and be prepared for the coming of the Messiah. And the 4th Sunday of Advent has us focus on the events immediately before the birth of Jesus.

Other than going to the Sacrament of Reconciliation (by far the most important way to prepare ourselves for the Lord's Coming), a greater focus on prayer, self-denial, and works of charity help us to prepare our souls for Christ's coming. Other devotions help as well. Two that I like are the Advent Wreath and the Advent Calendar. The following is a great explanation of the Advent Wreath which I got from <u>www.catholiceducation.org</u>.

The actual origins of the Advent Wreath are uncertain. There is evidence of pre-Christian Germanic peoples using wreathes with lit candles during the cold and dark December days as a sign of hope in the future warm and extended-sunlight days of Spring. Definitely by the Middle Ages, Christians "baptized" this tradition and used Advent wreathes as part of their spiritual preparation for Christmas. After all, Christ is "the Light that came into the world" to dispel the darkness of sin and to radiate the truth and love of God (cf. John 3:19-21). By 1600, both Catholics and Lutherans had more formal practices surrounding the Advent wreath.

The symbolism of the Advent wreath is beautiful. The circle of the wreath, which has no beginning or end, symbolizes the eternity of God, the immortality of the soul, and the everlasting life found in Christ, the eternal Word of the Father, who entered our world becoming true man and who was victorious over sin and death through His own passion, death, and resurrection. The four candles represent the four weeks of Advent. Three candles are purple and one is rose. The purple candles in particular symbolize the prayer, penance, and preparatory sacrifices and goods works undertaken at this time. The rose candle is lit on the third Sunday, Gaudete Sunday, when the priest also wears rose vestments at Mass; Gaudete Sunday is the Sunday of rejoicing, because the faithful have arrived at the midpoint of Advent, when their preparation is now half over and they are close to Christmas. The progressive lighting of the candles symbolizes the expectation and hope surrounding our Lord's first coming into the world and the anticipation of His second coming to judge the living and the dead. The light signifies Christ, the Light of the world. Some modern day adaptions include a white candle placed in the middle of the wreath, which

represents Christ and is lit on Christmas Eve. Another tradition is to replace the three purple and one rose candles with four white candles, which will be lit throughout Christmas season.

In family practice, the Advent wreath is most appropriately lit at dinner time after the blessing of the food. On the First Sunday of Advent, the father of the family blesses the wreath, praying: "O God, by whose word all things are sanctified, pour forth Thy blessing upon this wreath, and grant that we who use it may prepare our hearts for the coming of Christ and may receive from Thee abundant graces. Who lives and reigns forever and ever. Amen."

Since Advent is a time to stir-up our faith in the Lord, the wreath and its prayers provide us a way to augment this special preparation for Christmas. Moreover, this good tradition helps us to remain vigilant in our homes and not lose sight of the true meaning of Christmas.
